In November, voters living within Gilbert Public School boundaries will decide a proposed \$100 million dollar bond. Voters last approved a bond in November 2015.

WHAT IS A BOND?

A bond provides GPS with additional funding for capital items such as:

- school renovations and improvements to buildings including special use facilities
- school security enhancements
- equipment and technology improvements
- bus equipment and replacements

Districts are not permitted to use bond funds for salaries, programs, or professional development.

PROPOSED BOND PROJECTS:

- Implement new security camera systems
 District-wide
- Renovate and upgrade performing arts and athletic facilities at secondary sites
- Standardize audio visual equipment K-12
- Enhance technology infrastructure and equipment K-12
- Replace student transportation vehicles

HOW WOULD A BOND AFFECT PROPERTY TAXES?

Bond debt is paid through the secondary property tax rate. As old bond debt is paid off new bond debt would take its place resulting in no planned increase in the secondary property tax rate for bonds.

In November, voters living within Gilbert Public School boundaries will decide a proposed 15% budget increase ("override"). The 10% override has been in place since school year 2016/17. Unless re-authorized, this 10% override will begin to expire school year 2021/22.

The requested 15% override will replace the 10% override, and will allow the District to increase its revenue by an additional 5% (about \$10.6 million). The total 15% budget increase would provide about \$31.8 million per year for 5 years and will decrease by 1/3 in each of years 6 and 7 unless renewed by the taxpayer.

WHAT IS AN OVERRIDE?

A budget override, also known as a budget increase, allows Gilbert Public Schools voters to approve additional funding above what the state formula provides.

ESTIMATED HOMEOWNER IMPACT:

Current monthly cost10% override\$8Proposed monthly cost15% override\$12Current annual cost10% override\$98Proposed annual cost15% override\$147

Based on an assessed home value of \$100,000. Approximate values rounded to the nearest whole dollar.

WHAT HAPPENS IF THE OVERRIDE DOESN'T PASS?

If the override/budget increase does not pass the District would have to cut about \$21 million from the budget over 3 years, starting in school year 2021/22.

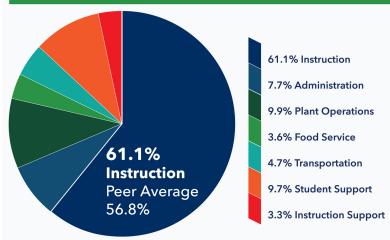
